President's Message....

The trajectory of the year

Dear members of AOFOG,

Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA) officials have retrieved a capsule sent to Earth from the Hayabusa2 space probe. Hayabusa2 started its journey in space six years ago as it headed towards the asteroid



Ryugu. Its target is believed to contain relatively large amounts of water and organic material when the solar system was born 4.6 billion years ago. It took four years to reach the asteroid, which is about 300 million kilometers from Earth. What an epic journey!

It's only one year since I became president of AOFOG on November 13, 2019, but I would like to look back on my journey as president. The term of office of the president is until the next Congress, so I was supposed to finish my term at the 27th Bali Congress on March 14, 2021. In other words, I should have been busy preparing for the Congress by this time, with only

three months left. But the pandemic of COVID-19 has changed everything. We were forced to postpone the Bali Congress to May 2022. The official decision was announced on April 27, this year, but no one knew at that point how reasonable it would be to postpone it. But now it can be said that this decision was not wrong for two reasons: firstly It usually takes at least one and a half years to prepare for the congress because some sessions have a selection process in advance, and secondary the vaccine against COVID-19 is now in the practical stage. It will take some time before this becomes available worldwide, but at least it will definitely be a great relief in the future.

Many meetings and conferences are held online or are hybrids held online and on-site. AOFOG was not an exception. As reported in this newsletter, we are very pleased that all the standing committees held many webinars and many AOFOG members have attended. Rather, it is the convenience unique to a webinar that there are a large number of participants from abroad, which is unthinkable at ordinary in a face to face seminar.

During this time, I attended in person and gave plenary lectures only two overseas congresses, that is OGSB annual congress at Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh on 19-21 Dec. 2019 and AICOG meeting at Lucknow, India on 30 Jan - 2 Feb. 2020. I am very honored to be an Honorary Fellow of the Indian College of Obstetrics and Gynecology at this meeting. Besides, I attended the OGSM / AOFOG intensive course in an obstetric emergency (iCOE) held in Vientiane, Laos. The international conferences attended and spoken online was The 106th Annual Congress of Korean Society of Obstetrics and Gynecology The 25th Seoul International Symposium, held on 27 Sept. 2020, in Seoul, Korea, the 2020 Annual convention

of Philippine Obstetrical and Gynecological held on 12 November 2020. Society in Manila Philippines and FOGSI POGS international virtual conference Just Tumor held on 12 Dec. 2020.

Executive Board Meeting and Action Plan Meeting were held on 11-12 Jan. 2020 in Luang Prabang, Laos. However, the Executive Board Meeting on 18 July 2020 was held online. The AOFOG Congress 2022 meeting was held on 24, Aug. 2020, and 16 Nov. 2020 with the participation of Prof. Budi Wiweko, Secretary-General of the Indonesian Society of Obstetrics and Gynecology (POGI), Dr. Andon Hastiantero, Chairperson-LOC AOFOG 2022. We received an explanation about the progress of preparations for the conference and had a question and answer session. Normally, the venue of a congress is to be confirmed by a site visit, but this is not done at the present moment when travel is restricted due to COVID-19.

Hayabusa2 has delivered us a wonderful Christmas gift. What gifts has AOFOG offered to its members over the past year? Regarding topics related to COVID-19, we launched the COVID-19 corner on the AOFOG website to provide information to members and post related videos. During this time when face-to-face workshops were difficult to hold, we delivered webinars to our members. Each webinar has been evaluated by the participants, but I would like to make efforts to improve it by referring to the results in a future webinar.

Hayabusa2 has delivered us a wonderful Christmas gift. And you all gave AOFOG a gift of "various forms of support". I would be happy if the activities of AOFOG this year could be of some help to our members.

AOFOG Oncology Committee in Collaboration with AOFOG Minimally Invasive Gynaecologic Surgery (MIGS) Committee

Report of 26th July 2020 Webinar:

AOFOG WebCME was held on 26th July 2020, with the theme of "Covid-19 and Gynaecological Cancer Management" to promote academics international cooperation, goodwill and share knowledge, particularly in Asia & Oceania on this field of Gynaecologic Oncology and Minimally Invasive Surgery.

Professor Kazunori Ochiai, AOFOG President, chaired the webinar and gave opening remarks with the introduction of AOFOG to the audience, while Professor Pisake Lumbiganon, President-Elect, gave the closing remarks at the end. Dr.Rohana Haththotuwa, Secretary-General, and Dr. Jaydeep Tank, the Deputy Secretary-General AOFOG conducted Q&A and feedback sessions. Professor Sarikapan Wilailak, Chair of Oncology Committee, and Professor Tsukasa Baba, Chair of Minimally Invasive Gynaecologic Surgery (MIGS) Committee, were moderators and speakers.



The Keynote speaker was Professor Sean Kehoe, Chair of FIGO Committee for Gynecologic Oncology, giving a talk on "Impact of COVID-19 on Gynaecologic Oncology". Other topics in Oncology covered the general principle of gynaecologic cancer patient management during the pandemic, surgery, radiotherapy, chemotherapy, targeted therapy, and immunotherapy as well as experiences in combating COVID-19 in New Zealand. The speakers were Professor Sarikapan Wilailak, Dr. Suresh Kumarasamy, Professor Hiralal Konar, Associate Professor Ka Yu Tse, and Dr. Ai Ling Tan. Topics in MIGS included current problems in MIGS, how to resume MIGS under COVID-19 impacts, and MIGS training under COVID-19: Japanese experiences. The speakers were Professor Tsukasa Baba, Professor Laila Arjumand Banu, Dr. Tomonori Hada, and Dr. Masanori Isobe.

Participants could learn how experts looked at the problems of taking care of gynaecologic cancer patients during the COVID-19 pandemic, and how to tackle them with the good principle as well as practical guidelines and suggestions. All sessions ran smoothly though some technical problems

occurred. Lots of questions were entertained during the Q & A session.

There were 541 participants from 16 countries (15 members, 1 non-member). Feedback of the webinar, using Survey Monkey, provided by Dr. Jaydeep Tank, yielded 21 participants (3.88%) who responded. Ninety-six percent of the participants found the "Scientific content-Topic" to be Excellent to Good, while 91%, 96%, and 87% found "Selection of speakers", "Punctuality" and "Ease of use of the Online Platform" to be Excellent to Good respectively. For the question "Were you aware of AOFOG before the webinar?": 78% answered "Yes", while 22% answered "No". Certificates of attendance were given to all participants who answered the survey. Certificates of contribution were given to all speakers.

Finally, we would like to thank all AOFOG executive members, Committee members, and speakers for their kind contribution and support. We would like to thank the Royal Thai College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists for being our Academic Partner in this event.

Other completed academic activities

Our statement, 'COVID-19 and Gynaecological Cancers: Asia and Oceania Federation of Obstetrics and Gynecology (AOFOG) Oncology Committee Opinion', in Sep 2020 and it has been accepted for publication in the Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Research in Nov 2020. We have also updated our statement under COVID-19 on the AOFOG website on 26 Nov 2020.

Future activities

Education is one of the main focus areas for the AOFOG. As the training programmes are not standardized in the Asia – Pacific region, Dr. Perapong Inthasorn will conduct a survey on the 'Gynecologic Oncology Subspecialty Training in Asia-Oceania'. The questionnaire will be distributed to different national societies and the results will be analysed afterward.

Cervical cancer is still the most common gynaecological cancer in Asia. The AOFOG has the obligation to take the lead to harmonise the practices of cervical cancer prevention. Dr. Ka Yu Tse has drafted an online questionnaire on 'Current status of cervical cancer screening in Asia-Oceania' to collect the data on the use of cervical cancer screening tools and vaccination programmes. An invitation letter will be sent to individual national societies soon.

We will also organise a webinar on 'Elimination of Cervical Cancer in AOFOG Region' on 9 Jan 2021, 14:00 – 16:00. Dr. Nathalie Broutet from the World Health Organization will give the keynote lecture on 'WHO Strategies to Eliminate Cervical Cancer', along with related interesting topics by our AOFOG speakers.

Report from Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility Committee

Our Committee contributed a lecture on "Implication of COVID-19 for Fertility Care", delivered by Dr. Jaydeep Tank, in the International Webinar on Recent Researches of COVID-19 & Scope of Implementation in Clinical Practice Beyond. This 2.5-hour webinar was jointly held by AOFOG and the Obstetrical and Gynecological Society of Bangladesh on Friday 13 November 2020.



On the same line, our Committee held a WebCME on "COVID-19 and Fertility Care" on Saturday 14th November 2020. In this 2-hour



programme, we updated our members on the current views regarding the impact of COVID-19 on fertility and pregnancy as well as measures to take when resuming fertility services during pandemic times. We were honoured to have Dr. Luca Gianaroli (Italy) and Dr. Edgar Mocanu (Ireland) from the COVID-19 Working Group, European Society of Human Reproduction and Embryology (ESHRE) to educate us on these important issues. We also had representatives from some Asian and Oceanic countries sharing their experience with fertility service provision under the COVID pandemic; they include Professor William Ledger (Australia), Dr. Anita Rajorhia (India), Dr. Kaori Koga (Japan), Dr. Virgilio Jr. Novero (Philippines) and Professor Kamthorn Pruksananonda (Thailand). There were 454 members registered for the meeting, and 137 from 18 countries participated in the live session. The session recording will be available on the AOFOG website for those who were unable to join the programme in real-time. With our concerted efforts, we hope we shall overcome these difficult times.

Our Committee also presented an AOFOG Session on "Infertility" in the 53rd Annual Scientific Congress of the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists on 12-13 December 2020. The session, chaired by Dr. Jaydeep Tank (India) and Dr. Anita Rajorhia (India), consisted of three lectures on (1) OHSS-free clinic: is it possible? (Prof. William Ledger, Australia), (2) Obesity and reproduction (Dr. Andon Hestiantoro, Indonesia) and (3) Pre-implantation genetic testing for aneuploidy: is it helpful? (Dr. Virgilio Novero, Philippines). These were important topics in the modern-day practice of Reproductive Medicine.

Report of the Ultrasound Committee

Myanmar Ultrasound Webinar was conducted last October 1, 2020, in collaboration with Myanmar Obstetrics and Gynecology Society and GE Healthcare. The invaluable support of Myanmar President, Professor Aye Aung contributed to the success of the activity despite the extraordinary circumstances we are in.



The webinar activity started with opening remarks delivered by Professor Aye Aung which was followed by the didactics. The ultrasound lecture was divided into two parts. The first session was about First Trimester Anomaly Scanning followed by Basic Gynecology Ultrasound scans. The lecture on First-trimester Anomaly scan emphasized the common anomalies in the spinal cord, thorax and chest, nuchal translucency, fetal abdomen, fetal heart, and fetal

limbs diagnosed in the first trimester. Sonomorphologic features and techniques to help diagnose the anomaly were discussed thoroughly. For the Basic Gynecology Scan, the lecture was subdivided into normal and pathologic uterus, endometrium, ovaries, and cervix. ISUOG ultrasound guidelines on Morphologic uterus sonographic assessment (MUSA), International Endometrial Tumor Assessment (IETA and the International Ovarian Tumor Assessment (IOTA) were discussed. Tips and tricks were given on how to assess the sonomorphologic features of each condition. The session was followed by the questions and answers of the participants. There were 206 attendees, mostly OB-GYN consultants, with 2 radiologists, postgraduate students, and trainees. Participants were members of the Myanmar Medical Association (MMA) and were affiliated with the following institutions: University of Medicine - Magway, Center Women's Hospital in Yangon, University of Medicine - Mandalay, and Ministry of Health and Sports.

To be able to continue an AOFOG driven activity in this extraordinary situation, the ultrasound committee chaired by Dr. Nelinda Catherine P. Pangilinan (Manila, Philippines) together with the committee members: Poonam Charan (Australia), Poonam Loomba (India), and Voon Hian Yan (Malaysia) conceptualized an activity that was outside of the usual ultrasound workshop activities by conducting an ultrasound webinar lecture series with 6 speakers representing the AOFOG member country to give lectures on topics that are commonly encountered in our clinical practice.

The webinar on ultrasound was conducted last November 29, 2020, from 11:00 am, to 2:30 pm, Singapore time. Though the activity was presented on a different platform, the ultrasound committee members bonded together and shared opinions on how to make the flagship project of 2020 as successful as possible. With the new normal way of preparing a conference, the team was able to meet via zoom for the first time, with warm introductions and the magic touch of each triggering the online relationship on working together and planning for the next activity. The assistance and guidance of the AOFOG Secretary-General, Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa (Sri Lanka), and the President, Professor Kazunori Ochiai (Japan) contributed to the orderly and smooth webinar preparations. Dr. Jaydeep Tank, the AOFOG Deputy Secretary-General (India) headed feedback evaluation and Dr. Krishnendu Gupta(India), Committee Chair on Sexual and Reproductive Health shared his wisdom and encouragement.

After a series of consultations among the committee members, we agreed on the title of the webinar and the speakers. The first ultrasound webinar was entitled "OBS-GYN ultrasound: Impact on clinical decisions". The speakers were invited from different countries and were experts in their respective topics. The webinar activity started with opening remarks from President Kazanori Ochiai as he presented a brief history of AOFOG. The morning session was moderated by one of the committee members, Dr. Poonam Loombra (India) who gave the course overview and the introduction of the first three (3) speakers. Dr. Poonam Charan (Australia) discussed thoroughly Deep Infiltrating Endometriosis (DIE), and the relationship between ultrasound and symptomatology. Dr. Charan emphasized the importance of ultrasound among patients with endometriosis to assess the presence of endometriotic implants to help the clinician in stratifying each case before surgery. Dr. Rozi Aditya Arvananda (Indonesia) presented actual cases of the placenta accreta spectrum from his institution. Ultrasound diagnosis and practical tips in managing PAS were discussed



extensively. Professor Tiran Dias (Sri Lanka), a maternal-fetal specialist, gave a concise and brief discussion on the ultrasound diagnostic criteria for non-viable pregnancy. The afternoon session was moderated by Voon Hian Yan (Malaysia). He presented the course overview and introduced the speakers. Intrauterine growth restrictions: Diagnosis and surveillance were thoroughly discussed by Dr. Tony Tan (Singapore). The lecture on intrauterine growth restrictions received a lot of questions during the Q&A, a timely topic, as we always encounter such problems in our daily practice. Dr. Tuangsit Wataganara (Thailand) gave an extensive lecture on Birth weight discordance and

neonatal morbidity in twin pregnancy. In cases of intrauterine demise in twins, Dr. Tuagnsit gave an extensive discussion and an updated technology to decrease the risk of neurologic morbidity of the other twin. The last lecture was given by Dr. Nelinda Pangilinan (Philippines), the chair of the ultrasound committee, about ultrasound staging of cervical cancer. Extensive ultrasound parameters assessing the cervical tumor involvement which included cervical stromal, parametrium, paracolpium extensions lymph nodes, and finally abdominal structure evaluation to complete staging. Closing remarks were given by AOFOG Vice president, Dr. John Tait (New Zealand). He emphasized the important role of ultrasound in the management of common obstetrical and gynecological cases. Despite the unusual situation brought about by the pandemic, AOFOG activities continued among the member countries. The time difference was not a factor in pushing through with the new normal way of conducting conferences.

The webinar ultrasound activity was sponsored by GE Healthcare with gowebinar as the platform used. On November 26, 2020, during the dry run among the speakers, a total of 875 participants were registered. Subsequently, on November 27, 2020, the GE team updated the ultrasound committee that the number of pre-registered attendees increased to 1117, which did not include the GE team and speakers. GE healthcare team made changes to the link and emailed all the pre-registered attendees of the updated link. However, there was some difficulty logging in since some attendees were still using the previous link that they used upon pre-registration. A total of 450 participants attended the ultrasound webinar.

Some technical difficulties occurred during the day of the activity which included the feedback evaluation as well as the certificate of attendance. The feedback evaluation was sent to the participants a week after the actual webinar with a less than desired output from the survey. The feedback evaluation was created by AOFOG using SurveyMonkey. A total of 112 respondents completed the evaluation, with 98 completely answering the form. Though it was not representative of the total participants of the webinar session, the overall rating for education and usefulness of the topics was excellent. The majority of the attendees were aware of the existence and activities of AOFOG.

Completed academic activities

The above-mentioned Guidance Statements were prepared in November 2020 and submitted for the approval of the Executive Board. On approval, the Guidance Statements will be uploaded to the AOFOG website, under the newly designed "COVID-19 Corner".

SRH Committee Members news

- Prof. Krishnendu Gupta was an "Invited Speaker" at the International Webinar on "Recent Researches of COVID-19 & Scope of Implementation in Clinical Practice Beyond", organised by Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) in association with AOFOG, on 13 November 2020. Prof Gupta spoke on "The effect of COVID-19 on the Sexual & Reproductive Health (SRH) services in the AOFOG region: An overview and scope of research".
- Prof. Rowshan Ara Begum was a "Special Guest" at the "International Webinar on Recent Researches of COVID-19
 & Scope of Implementation in Clinical Practice Beyond", organized by OGSB in association with AOFOG, on 13
 November 2020.
- Prof. Krishnendu Gupta and Dr. S Shantha Kumari were both "Invited Faculty" with responsibilities to be a Session Chair and Speaker at the FOGSI-POGS International Virtual Conference "Just Tumors", supported by AOFOG, between 11-13 December 2020.

Future planned activities

- In addition to the two earlier webinars conducted by the committee in July and September 2020, the committee
 plans to conduct more webinars covering SRH topics of interest and collaborate with National Societies and
 Federations of mutual interest.
- To act as an academic resource center/ facilitator for future scientific programmes related to SRH in future AOFOG conferences.
- To publish a "Good Clinical Practice Recommendations (GCPRs) on SRH" based on the regional perspectives of AOFOG.



Report of the Urogynecology Committee

A WebCME was organized by the AOFOG Urogynecology Committee in association with The Royal Thai College of Ob-Gyn (RTCOG) on "Urogynecology in the fastchanging world" in September 2020. The presentations were excellent and there were more than 200 participants. I believe that this successful academic exchange will enhance the quality of care urogynecology in the Asia Pacific, as well as boost the confidence of the Committee to continue hosting more activities according to the objectives of the AOFOG in the future, even in the midst of instability from the pandemic.



Update regarding future activities

We have at least two programmes planned for the next year:

a. An international webinar on Urogynecology with the Urogynecology committee of AOFOG and ISO KGH and Urogynecology committee of FOGSI. One of the members of the Urogynecology committee of AOFOG, Dr. Srikala Prasad from India, and I will collaborate to organise it.



b. The second one is the international joint conference of Urogynecology with APUGA, TAOG, and TUGA during the second half of 2021 in Taiwan.

- Form training modules and centers for quality screening, diagnosis, and treatment all over Asia Oceania.
- Move as one towards information and education campaigns for a healthy lifestyle, vaccination, screening, and early treatment.

THE 9th HPV SUMMIT: An AOFOG Manila Declaration Crusade

The HPV Summit, a CECAP Cervical Cancer Prevention Network Advocacy which started in 2011, is a Philippine program with Jhpiego, an affiliate of Johns Hopkins University whose goal is to move as one, together with the medical experts, patient groups, various stakeholders and advocates to bridge the gap in empowering communities to fight HPV and cervical cancer.

Its goal is to promote health, community education, discuss updates on the HPV virus, cervical cancer, and other relevant topics that go beyond the disease. It commits to build a HPV and cervical cancer-free Asia Oceania by leading the discussions on the burden of disease, preventive strategies, including vaccination, therapy options, and national health care policies and programs related to HPV, HIV, and cervical cancer. It pushes for a strengthened country readiness for the implementation of the expanded cervical cancer and control efforts.

The crusade collaborators include AOFOG (Asia Oceania Federation of Obstetrics and Gynecology), POGS (Philippine Obstetrical Gynecological Society), DOH (the Philippine Department of Health), and CECAP.

THE 9th HPV SUMMIT was conducted in four consecutive webinar series. Taking the acronym for each webinar theme, this series was entitled HPV free LEAD.

- Webinar 1 August 26, 2020 "Leveraging on the Asia Oceania Commitment for Cervical Cancer elimination"
- Webinar 2 September 23, 2020 "Empowered with Science: Innovative Ways Towards HPV-Free Asia Oceania"
- Webinar 3 November 4, 2020 "Advancing Healthcare Policy for HPV- Free Philippines"
- Webinar 4 November 25, 2020 "Directing Concerted Actions Towards an HPV-Free and Cervical Cancer Elimination in the Philippines and Asia Oceania"


With the 4 webinars, there were 550 to 1,250 Webex participants and 2726 to 3600 FB lives viewers, with almost 80 to 90% physicians, government officials DOH personnel, nurses, midwives, patient groups, CSOs advocates, lay and the media.

For media advocacy, there were 12 media coverages with 3.75 M PR value in print, online on broadcast 13.88m circulation and potential reach. There was 3 broadcast pick up, 4.59 M circulation range with total 1.05 M Ad value. On print and online there was 9 pick up with 1-6M website visits and 457 social media engagements.
