Dear Members,



As my term comes to an end, allow me to share my reflections of the past year, in particular, the two achievements I consider to be the most significant, and my thoughts about the direction of the society for the future.

One of the greatest achievements of the society this term and the one that I am most proud of, is

the launching of our very own Intensive Course in Obstetric Emergencies (iCOE). Under the very capable leadership of Dr Gunasegaran PT Rajan and Dr Thaneemalai Jeganathan, the inaugural iCOE was held in Yangon, Myanmar in early 2014 followed by three more in KL in September and December 2014 and a third in March this year. The first Malaysian iCOE was evaluated by Dr Henry Murray, Maternal Fetal Chair, AOFOG, and supported by his very favourable feedback, is in the process of being formally recognised by AOFOG. It is my belief that this course will greatly benefit many Obstetricians, present and future, in our united efforts to improve the standard of care of women and their unborn children in Malaysia and beyond.

Another great achievement of this year has been the work on the commemorative book to mark the 50th anniversary of our society, entitled 'A History of Obstetrics & Gynaecology in Malaysia' led by Prof Zainul Rashid. Many, many hours have been invested in this project and I am certain that it will be a document that all of us will be proud of.

As we look ahead to the next term under the able leadership of Prof Zainul Rashid, my greatest concern for our fraternity is the increasingly hostile environment in which we are being made to practise, and exponentially rising costs of professional indemnity, which if uncurbed will result in a paucity of practitioners of our art in the near future. It is my vision that the society should form a subcommittee dedicated to advocating for this cause, and as its starting point, work towards presenting a paper to the Prime Minister detailing the scope of the problem both current and future,

"A HISTORY OF OBSTETRICS AND GYNAECOLOGY THROUGH THE EYES OF OGSM"







Minutes of the First General Meeting of Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Malaya

PRIVATE MATERNITY CENTRES MOH DISCUSSION

During this year, the OGSM council has been made aware of the struggles of some of our fraternity who own private maternity homes. With this in mind, OGSM has formed a ad hoc working committee and appointed Dr Jaspal Singh Sachdev as a Chairman.

A working committee comprising of 20 members were formed and several recommendations were made. We are happy to report that a meeting was successfully arranged between the Ministry of Health and this working committee.


The following problems and possible solutions were discussed

1) Resident Doctors

OGSM Proposal Centres without resident anaesthetists and paediatricians must have a visiting doctor available at all times.

 In the event the visiting doctor is unable to attend, a referral mechanism must be in place.

ATTENDING BABY ON DELIVERY IN LABOUR ROOM



Ministry Feedback

- The referring hospital will have to be responsible for emergency cases such as fetal distress, cord prolapses and abruption placenta.
- Medical Officers who has at least 3 years of experience working under a specialist (in the related field) who is more than 5 years post specialization may work if they have been credentialed and priviledged by their Heads of Department in the Government Hospital.
- This medical officer must have a covering specialist who will help to manage complicated cases.
- The visiting specialist will need to include the maternity/single discipline O&G setup in their APC.
- Resident obstetricians should be present in the centre at least 60% of the time in a 9 to 5 working day week. They will have to list their practice as the primary place of practice in the APC.

2) Post Basic Training for Nurses in Midwifery, Perioperative (OT) care and Paediatrics

•	Staff nurses with 3 years or more experience in a discipline can be allowed to stand in for post basics.		
•	A fellowship training programme to be arranged with the nearby government hospital.		

3) Nursing Quota

•	Quota will remain as 2 beds to 1 staff into 3 shifts at all times. Total requirement will be divided into 45% registered nurses and 55% nursing assistants.	•	Nursing staff may include JM, Penolong Jururawat, JD, Pembantu Jagaan Peribadi/ Nurse aides, MA

4) Licensing

He talked on The Approach to the Management of Infertile Couples and Treatment of Unexplained Infertility.

All the talks given from the various subspecialties were informative and though provoking. There were talks on urogynaecology, gynaecology oncology, materno-fetal medicine and maternal medicine. But it wasn't just clinical O&G. The trainees also were briefed on training pathways in Malaysia and what they can hope for in years to come.

In between the talks and lectures, the trainees got to test their knowledge with EMQ and SBA questions.

There were only 25 trainees registered for the conference this year. We had trainees all the way from Sabah and Sarawak who flew in just for the conference. MASTERCLASS ON MRCOG PART 2: UNDERSTANDING UK PRACTICE

The Masterclass on MRCOG Part 2: Understanding UK Practice was successfully held on 9th May 2015 at Seminar Room 1, International Medical University (IMU) Seremban, with total of 33 participants mainly from west Malaysia. This course was organised by OGSM trainee conference, which catered mainly for MRCOG Part 2 goers to help them understand the clinical practice in the United Kingdom. The organising committee were Prof Nazimah Idris, Dr. Kavitha Nagandla, Dr. Teoh Ai Yean, Dr. Chong Jun Joy, Dr. Lim Kian Hwa, Dr. Tan Ying An, and Dr. Rosita Khanum.

We were honoured to have Prof Omar Sany and Dr. Shilpa Nambiar as our speakers. Prof Omar was formerly working as consultant in the UK and with his vast working experience there, he had helped the trainees understand the basic concept in labour ward management and prioritisation based on UK practice. As one of the RCOG examiner and MRCOG Part 2 course provider, Dr. Shilpa had given an eye opener to the trainees on how to pass the MRCOG Part 2 exam. She gave informative and useful advice on how to prepare for the exam, recommended reading materials

and how to prepare for the exam. She also gave lectures on risk management and clinical audit, topics which have become increasingly important both in clinical practice and as a favourite exam topic. There were Q&A sessions after each lecture and the trainees active participation made the course both interesting and lively.

The half-day course ended well with positive feedback from the participants. They had also suggested for OGSM Trainee Conference to conduct further courses mainly to help them tackle EMQs in labour ward management, statistic and risk management.

INFERTILITY MASTERCLASS



This event was jointly organised by OGSM and Persatuan Obstetrik dan Ginekologi Negeri Sembilan (POGNS) with the aim to help O&G trainees to understand the latest development and ethical issues in reproductive medicine. We had 43 OGSM enthusiastic trainees.

We were priviledged to have 2 private practitioners speak, Dr.

Leong Wai Yew and Dr. Navdeep Singh. It was a great opportunity for our trainees to have these experts in reproductive medicine share their personal experiences and relate the latest research in reproductive medicine in the Malaysian context.

Topics that were covered during the course included the assessment of both female and male infertility, the art of ART, special considerations in reproductive medicine and real life cases. The trainees were very interactive during the Q&A session of the lectures until the sessions had to be extended into the lunch hour due to the overwhelming passion and interest generated during the discussion.



The Masterclass was wrapped up with an OSCE session to enhance the understanding of reproductive medicine and application of the clinical knowledge. Three participants had voluntarily taken part in the OSCE station that was conducted in a fishbowl style, followed by discussion on the relevant answer scheme. It offers the trainees the chance to learn from observation and self-reflection techniques.

The eight hours Masterclass ended well with a positive feedback from all trainees.

There were 5 presentations from various key NiPT providers, followed by a lively round table discussion moderated by Dr Raman Subramaniam. The discussion was enlightening and it cleared doubts in many areas pertaining to Non invasive Prenatal Testing. The morning session was wrapped up with a talk on 'Genetic Counselling' by Ms Juliana Lee, a certified Genetic Counsellor.

The afternoon session started off with a guest lecture by Dr Tan Hock Lim, a Consultant Paediatric Surgeon from Prince Court Medical Centre on 'Fetal Hydronephrosis' followed by presentation of four interesting cases. The case presentation and discussion were by Assoc. Prof. Hamizah Ismail, Dr Anna Liza, Dr Haliza Ghazali and Dr Wong Yong Wee.

The meeting ended at 5 pm, with positive feedbacks from all those who attended. It was a fruitful meeting which brought about some very lively and interesting discussion on current clinical issues. We hope to have our next MFM Interest Group meeting in August this year.

PALESTINE MERCY MISSION



The plight of the Palestinians was one that really touched me and so when I spotted an appeal in a local newspaper for OBGYN for a medical mission there, I jumped at that opportunity.

I really did not know what I was in for. It was not an automatic acceptance, there were interviews, a grueling selection process but I managed to secure a spot on the team. We were then sent for training. The initial excitement was slowly replaced by a reality that we were going to a war torn country where real dangers lie. Being a doctor would not shield me from a bullet! We were taught how to handle situations like "what to do if you get shot" " what to do if a bomb went off"; it was surreal. The doctors underwent more training targeted at triaging, resuscitation, setting up emergency camps.

After a 12 hour flight to Cairo, the real challenges began. We were briefed at the Malaysian Embassy and then transported to the 'Palestine Hospital' in Cairo. The 'hospital' was housed in an apartment building. What I saw there were both heartbreaking and inspiring. Severe injuries, emotional and physical scars but in the face a adversity, we also witness grace and courage. We approached a young man who had lost a leg and had painful 2nd degree burns on his abdomen. He greeted us with a cheery "how are you" and a beautiful smile. It is an image I will forever keep in my heart. He has suffered so much and yet could continue to smile.

We visited 2 other hospitals which housed injured patients from Palestine. The pattern of injuries were almost the same. Mainly lower limb injuries and burns.

The next morning our team prepared to cross the border into Gaza City. There were multiple delays and our frustrations mounted. We were greeted by masked, armed soldiers at the border. Our leaders negotiated for 6 hours for our team to cross but in the end, they only allowed 3 of our team to go. Teary goodbyes were said and we prayed hard for the brave men that continued on as it was a dangerous journey indeed as they entered the war zone. They brought with them a truckload of urgently needed food and medical supplies.

The rest of us went back to Cairo and visited other hospitals that housed injured Palestinians. Although only 3 of our team ultimately made it into Gaza, the mission was considered a success as we managed to delivered urgently need food and medical supplies.

This journey has opened my eyes to the wonder of the human spirit, from the strength of the Palestinians who has not lost hope even in the face of injury and loss, the dedication of the health care workers there, to the generosity of the Eygptian government who provides medical attention for these refugees for free.

Malaysians has much to be thankful for, we live in peace and harmony. I pray that the war will end soon and that people will learn to share and appreciate each other more. To my fellow Malaysians, be thankful that we live in peace and harmony. I pray hard that we will never learn to live without it.

WHAT TO DO IN SARAWAK

SARAWAK, THE HOME OF ADVENTURE

Whether you only have an evening or a few days, here are some adventures to be had.

EVENING ADVENTURE:

Spend an evening enjoying seafood Sarawak style. Topspot, where fresh and abundant seafood is to be had. A must try is Umai, crawfish salad (the Sarawakian Ceviche). Wash it all down with a local desert, the ABC (shaved ice).

EVENING ADVENTURE 2

A visit to Kuching will be incomplete if you have not visited Kuching's Waterfront. The Waterfront boasts a whole kilometre of captivating scenery and buildings along the river. This is perhaps one of the most 'happening' places in Kuching, you canshop, eat or just watch the world go by. Eateries (posh and humble), hotels (budget and 5 star), shops (souvenirs, clothing and more) can all be found here. You can even opt for a leisurely boat ride to catch in all the sights that the waterfront has to offer.

You can find monuments paying tribute to Raja Brooke, the oldest Chinese Temple in Kuching along here. Sunset at the waterfront is a photo opportunity not to be missed. After the sun sets, you will be rewarded with a breathtaking view of Kuching by night.

SARAWAK HIGHLIGHTS

Start your adventure by soaking up the local culture at the Sarawak Cultural Village at the foothills of Gunung Santubong. Great for kids and those young at heart. The cultural show is a must. Feast your eyes on the grace, beauty and colour of native Sarawakian dances. Sooth your soul with its traditional tunes.

Stop for lunch at Kampung Buntal near Damai Beach for seafood. A hidden gem, Restoran 88 comes highly recommended. Do not be fooled by its humble surroundings, there is good food to be had here.

Walk your lunch off at the famous Damai Beach. Enjoy the serenity and fresh air. Complete your day exploring modern Sarawakian cusine at the D'yak (details included in the gastronomic portion of this article)

SARAWAK HIGHLIGHTS 2

Semenggoh Wildlife Centre is an experienced not to be missed. Founded in 1975, it is a rehabilitation centre for Sarawak Wildlife, most notably, the Orang Utan. A mere 30 minute drive, you will experience Sarawak nature at its best as you need to do a 20 minute trek before arriving at the centre. Feeding times are probably the best times to see these Orang Utan. Feeds are scheduled daily at 9am and 3pm.

Next stop for the more adventurous is Bau town. Bau was a gold mining town in its heyday but now serves as a stepping stone to 2 nearly natural wonders. Gua Pari-pari (Fairy Cave) is a limestone cave. Prepare to be awed by the staglamites and stalactites in here. The Fairy Cave takes its name from one of these structures that is said to resemble the Chinese Goddess of Mercy or Kuan Yin. About 10 minutes away is Gua Angin (Wind Cave), named for the continuos breeze that flows through these caves. You will see the cave's natural inhabitants here in large numbers namely swiftlets and bats. The views from these caves are breathtaking and well worth the trip. It is hoever, not for the faint hearted. Come prepared with good walking shoes.

The Borneo Highlands would be a natural next stop to recharge your batteries. It sits about 1000m above sea level and you can enjoy refreshing cool mountain air. You can opt to play golf, go on garden tours or even indulge a meal at the Annah Rais Café which features produce grown in their own garden.

For the discerning coffee drinker, Blackbean Coffee is a must. In true old world meets technology style, Black Bean Coffee uses locally sourced and roasted coffee beans, brewed to perfection. Sarawak in a cup, not to be missed.

Kuching also boasts many fusion and western food eateries. Junk, the restaurant with its unique ambience and mouthwatering dishes will not disappoint. Highly recommended are the baby lamb rack, the cod in crab meat sauce, angelhair pasta with prawns, their bruschetta and pizza. D'yak boasts a contemporary feel to Dayak Cuisine. Dine the headhunter's way amidst resplendent décor from the Dayak culture, it will be an experience you will never forget.
